Injury puts senior varsity captain out for the season by Lexie Perez

Left. Right. Left. Swing your arms back, bend down, jump up and hit the ball. Simple steps to spike the ball down on the opposing team. Pain shouldn't have been one of those steps. But for senior varsity captain Michelle Schuler, it became her routine.

"I originally hurt my shoulder in seventh grade when I separated my growth plates in my right shoulder," Shuler said. "Ever since then, I have always had pain in my shoulder."



It wasn't easy to play through the pain, but Schuler didn't want to do anything

"As I continued my volleyball career," Schuler said, "I developed multidirectional instability in my shoulder due to overuse, slowly causing my labrum to tear."

Schuler did not know what to expect out of what would come of her high school career.

"Sitting out my year on varsity after going through shoulder surgey really did not impact me," Shuler said. "In the back of my mind, I always knew that I had my senior year to leave my mark on Westlake volleyball."

After her junior year season, Schuler was cleared to play around the winter holidays. She couldn't wait to start practicing in offseason and return her skills to what they used to be.

"I remember after the first ball I hit, I began to cry due to pain," Schuler said. "Ever since that moment, I knew something was wrong with my shoulder."

She didn't want to let the pain get the best of her and continued to push forward. Through all of this hard work, however, she discovered that she had re-torn her labrum and ripped out the work from her previous surgery and would need to have surgery again.

"It occurred to me that I would never play again and everything I had dreamed of was being taken away," Schuler said. "It was definitely really hard to accept, but I knew there was no other place that I would rather be my senior year than being a varsity captain."

Being named varsity captain over the summer was a huge deal, and Schuler didn't want to let the injury get in the way of what she had always dreamed of.

"Some days I feel more like a manager rather than captain, but I am always happy to do anything to make the team better," Schuler said. "The hardest part is knowing that I can only contribute to the team by words and not by actually playing."
